Investment Objective

The Fund seeks to maximize long-term capital growth while managing the risk of capital erosion as the target date approaches through a dynamic rebalancing of exposure to diversified portfolios of peso-denominated fixed income securities and securities listed on the Philippine Stock Exchange and/or pooled funds that invest in these securities and other liquid fixed income instruments.

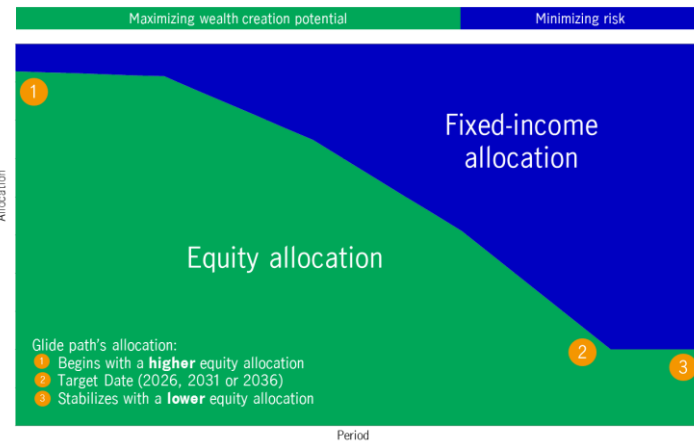

Why Peso Wealth Optimizer Funds?

Investing through a target date approach simplifies asset allocation for an average investor. The asset mix changes over time, becoming more conservative as the investor's financial milestone draws closer.

The change in asset allocation over time is called the **glide path** which Manulife designed specifically for these funds.



The glide path's objectives include:

- To maximize wealth accumulation prior to target date
- To minimize risk as the target date approaches
- To make wealth last long enough to support any financial needs beyond the chosen target date

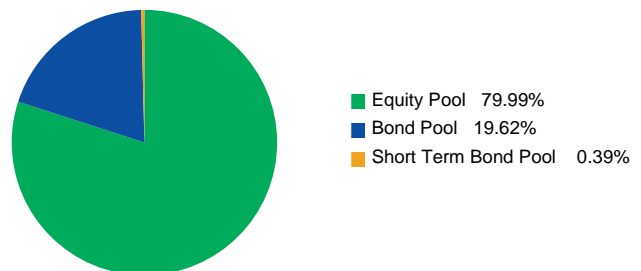

As per the fund's Investment Policy Statement, initial subscriptions are invested in fixed 93.32% Equities, 6.6% Long term bonds, 0.08% Short term bonds. The investments of these pools consist of the following:
 -Peso Bond Pool: Peso-denominated bonds of the Republic of the Philippines and term deposits.
 -Short Term Bond Pool: Peso-denominated bonds of the Republic of the Philippines with a term of up to three years and term deposits.

Market Review

In October, the Philippine Stock Exchange Index (PSEi) declined by 0.39% to 5,929 level, resulting in a year-to-date return of -6.59%. The market's ongoing decline was further influenced by a weakening peso, which reached as high as 59.235 intraday on October 29, 2025, and lowered GDP growth prospects as investors assessed the potential impact of recent infrastructure spending issues.

The Consumer Price Index for October held steady at 1.7%, aligning with market expectations. Additionally, core inflation eased to 2.5% from 2.6% in September as lower prices of some food items like meat and vegetables offset slight increases in fish and fruits.

In the Monetary Board Meeting held last October 9, 2025, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas reduced policy rates by 25 basis points to 4.75%, bringing total policy rate cuts to as much as 175 basis points since 2024. The rate cut in the last October meeting came as a surprise to the market, as the BSP reinforced its concerns about growth while inflation remains well below the target range of 2-4%.

On October 9, the Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas cut its policy rate by 25 basis points to 4.75%, citing downside risks to GDP due to public infrastructure spending concerns, typhoon season, and higher U.S. tariffs. However, the BSP also projects 2025 inflation at 1.7%, with levels expected to stay within the 2–4% target range thereafter. This set the tone which led local bond yields to decline 11 basis points on average.

Later in the month, global risks resurfaced: U.S.–China trade tensions flared with threats of restrictive policies, while the Fed cut its policy rate by 25 bps to balance inflation and growth. These developments capped further yield declines locally as investors locked in gains to close the month.

Outlook

For portfolio positioning, we are adding stocks with defensive qualities and attractive dividend yields to manage recent market volatility. We expect market activity to remain subdued for the rest of the fourth quarter of 2025 or until clear indicators of recovery in consumer and government spending emerge for the local economy. Notably, some stocks are currently trading at multi-year lows.

We are closely monitoring potential further policy rate cuts, as the BSP looks to reinforce its accommodative monetary policy considering softer inflation and potentially weak GDP growth outlook. Given the subdued inflation environment, the market anticipates a high probability of a 25-basis point rate cut at the next Monetary Board meeting in December.

As global trade risks begin to ease and with the backdrop of relatively stable Philippine fundamentals, we maintain a positive view on the local fixed income market while keeping a cautious stance. We will continue to capitalize on yield upticks, keeping a defensive duration position.
